



Alternative Plans Review and Inspections: Consumer Information¹ (CORRECTED)

Background

Traditionally, construction plans review and approval and construction work inspections are done by government personnel—usually city or county building department personnel. Certain types of construction (such as restaurants, hospitals, and more) are subject to state and/or federal requirements and inspection.

As of 2002, Florida allows the use of “private providers” for some plans review and inspection services, subject to a number of requirements or restrictions:

1. The decision to use a private provider must be made by the property owner, and the property owner must comply with the requirements found in section 553.73, Florida Statutes. Private providers include Florida licensed engineers, architects, and building code administrators or inspectors. The type of inspection or review that may be performed by any of these licensees depends on their respective qualifications.
2. Private provider services are limited to building code compliance (structural, mechanical, electrical, plumbing, and accessibility components of the building) and do not include review for other codes

such as land use, environmental, or fire.

Reviews or approvals outside of what may be performed by a private provider (such as site development plans) must be successfully completed before the beginning of building plans review.

3. A property owner using a private provider is required to notify the applicable building department of this when applying for a building permit. The building department may concurrently inspect subject to specified time limitations.
4. A property owner considering the use of a private provider for plans review *or* inspections should consult with the appropriate building department as the building official may require use of a private provider for both. The building department should be consulted to determine which services may be available in its jurisdiction.

Cautions:

- While a property owner may save time and achieve other benefits with the use of a private provider, extreme care must be taken to ensure a complete understanding of
